Introduction

The Center for Online Safety and Liberty (COSL) is the reimagining of an organization that was formed in 2018 to promote a simple concept: that online safety and liberty are not in opposition, but rather are complementary values. Indeed, fostering safer, more inclusive digital spaces depends on embracing freedom of expression and privacy as foundational principles.

For instance, encrypted communication tools not only protect users' privacy but also enable survivors of abuse to seek help without fear of being tracked or retaliated against. Similarly, robust protections for free expression allow marginalized voices to share their experiences and advocate for change, which is essential for creating safer and more inclusive online spaces.

Without these rights, safety becomes selective – often at the expense of those who are already most vulnerable – or conditional on the silencing of those who express critical or controversial thoughts. Thus our mission is to empower individuals and communities to thrive online by building safer spaces, fostering creativity, combating harm, and championing digital rights and freedom.

Leadership and Governance

As part of the organization's preparations for relaunch, the Board of Directors was dissolved and new appointments were made in November 2024. In parting with previous Executive Director Gilian Tenbergen, the organization passed a motion of thanks to her for the experienced and credible voice that she provided during its transitional period.


Jeremy Malcolm, Chair

Kristin received her Master of Social Work with a concentration in Health & Mental Health from the Boston College Graduate School of Social Work. She then trained at the South Shore Sexual Health Center, working toward her certification in Sex Therapy through the American Association of Sexuality Educators, Counselors, and Therapists (AASECT). Additionally, she went on to earn her Doctor of Social Work degree at Simmons University, focusing on antiracism, social justice, anti-stigma, and problematic sexual behaviors.

Priority Areas

In 2024, COSL commenced the process of relaunching the organization under its new name as an umbrella s.501(c)(3) nonprofit to provide fiscal sponsorship to multiple independent projects that support our mission. For the upcoming five year period, we are organizing these projects within four priority areas:

Safer Hosting



Maintaining online spaces that are safer both for users and for creators is essential, and increasingly under threat. In this priority area COSL supports Liberato, a web hosting service that's secure, privacy-first, and pro-creator, along with a suite of open source trust and safety tools that are under development.

Supporting Fans



We promote self-expression, creativity, and connection in fan communities because these can be powerful spaces for shared joy, identity exploration, and creative collaboration. During 2025 COSL will be launching a new fan and creator platform with unique safety features, as well as a Beyond the Filter podcast.

Cyberbullying and Abuse



Treating online abuse as a preventable public health issue fosters empathy, prevention, and long-term solutions that reduce harm for everyone. COSL is sponsoring the evaluation of a peer support initiative for an at-risk community, and a successful anti-abuse deterrence campaign on Google Ads.

Legal Advocacy



We stand up for the human rights of freedom of expression and privacy online because because they are vital for inclusive, democratic societies. Among other projects, during 2025 we plan to launch a new transparency archive to shine a light on how platforms' child safety policies are being applied.

Financial Performance

As the organization relaunches, it is also effectively rebuilding itself financially. In the meantime, we are solvent and financially stable. Our current revenue comprises of donations from a small base of dedicated supporters. Our key financial objective for 2025 is to lessen our reliance on these donors by building revenue from business activities that support our charitable aims.

The main expenses incurred during 2024 were for exhibiting at two professional conferences: Sex Pos Con (Positive Sexuality Conference), sponsored by the Center for Positive Sexuality in February 2024, and the New York State Association for the Treatment and Prevention of Sexual Abuse/New York State Alliance for the Prevention of Sexual Abuse Joint Conference in May 2024.
